# 775 years of Kirkcaldy Old Kirk at the heart of the town...

This is a special year and a special time in the life of our town and our Old Kirk family - and it has nothing to do with Brexit!

On 21st March 1244 the Roman Catholic Bishop de Bernham of St. Andrews Diocese made his way to Kirkcaldy to consecrate the church here to St. Patrick and St. Brisse (St. Bryce) in a ceremony described in his service-book and recorded in the church annals.

This is the earliest written record of what is now Kirkcaldy Old Kirk, although we know that a Celtic church existed here for some 500 years before that. Columban monks had brought the Gospel across Scotland to this site

on the little hill above the harbour.

Today in the Old Kirk, still vibrant with Christian worship and community service as it has been over all these centuries. we celebrate its guardianship of Kirkcaldy's heritage and we rejoice that it still serves the community of Kirkcaldy in the heart of the now hard-pressed town centre.

To commemorate this 775th anniversary, we have compiled a year of celebratory events, and we hope that you will join in



sharing with us in some of these special events.

#### ...and counting!

Kirkcaldy Old Kirk Trust is looking to the future to secure the iconic tower that has watched over the High Street and the harbour since the 15th century.

We have been successful in obtaining a first round pass in Heritage Lottery funding : this means we have some funding and 18 months to prepare a detailed plan to restore the old building.

This will take professional skills, volunteer effort and a lot of resources, with the ultimate aim of achieving a second round pass from the National Lottery Heritage Fund in 2020 and £400,000 to see our plan implemented

One of the treasures of the Old Kirk is its fine pipe organ, built by August Gern in 1885 and considered by organists to

be one of the best instruments in the district. Recently we have had the

We have also introduced a post of Organ Scholar in a shared venture with our friends of St. Peter's Episcopal Church round the corner, to train the next generation of organists.

Encouraged by this interest, we have arranged a monthly programme of special organ recitals throughout this Anniversary year. It is fitting that Robin Bell, a friend of the Old Kirk and inspiring organist, will launch this series on Easter weekend, beginning our

775 programme with his recital of Easter music on Saturday 20th April.

All the organ recitals will take place on Saturdays at 12 noon and will be followed by a light buffet lunch at 1pm. A minimum donation of £5 is requested.



## Langtoun Jazz

Throughout 2019 you will find jazz on the menu in Kirkcaldy as Langtoun Jazz holds a series of jazz concerts to raise funds for a mini-jazz festival in the autumn.

Look out for the jazz organist Richard Michael playing in the Old Kirk in our 775 Organ Recital Series during Langtoun Jazz Festival weekend in October!

Long before that, however, is the next **jazz concert in the Old Kirk, on Saturday 6th April at 2pm – 4.15pm**  when the Andy Lawrenson Trio and the Busking Sharks will be playing.

Andy Lawrenson learned to play the violin through busking on the streets of Europe, Scandinavia, England, Scotland and Ireland, before returning to University of Northumbria to complete a music degree in the mid 1980's. A prominent figure on the North East Folk and Jazz scene, Andy now manages and gigs extensively with The Andy Lawrenson Trio, runs music workshops and teaches violin and guitar in North Yorkshire.

Paul Grainger is the double bass player, also much in demand, and Simon O'Byrne a professional guitarist for over two decades.

Also from the North-East come Busking Sharks Community Band - Charlie Williams, Beth Hipwell and Tom Potter.

#### Coming in May - Doorways in Drumordy

Lorna Moon was a Scots woman who left behind the sleepy Aberdeenshire village of her birth to become the highest-paid female screenwriter in 1920s Hollywood.

She got her big break after writing to the legendary director Cecil B DeMille with a withering critique of his latest release. However her book of short stories based on her home village of Strichen did not go down well with her fellowvillagers, who recognised themselves only too well in the gossipy characters she portrayed.

This witty, funny play is now touring again after a sell-out in 2010, and it is coming to Kirkcaldy Old Kirk on Friday 17th "The play that was banned from the local library because villagers recognized themselves in the characters!"
