It has four movements aptly called The Kirk Sessions:

1. about the Wode Psalter used in the early church in Scotland
2. about the witches locked in the tower
3. about Adam Smith

4. one cultural mix in the 21st century

The piece is written for choir, baritone soloist, piano, violin and harp and will form the framework of the programme. The rest of the night will include music from the instrumentalists and singers.

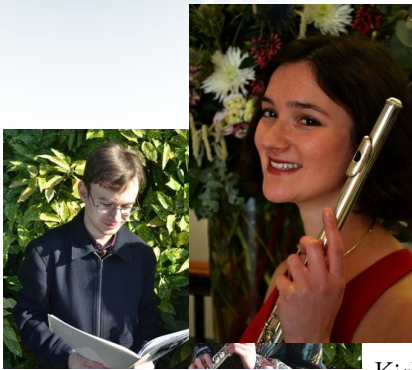

Next Double Bill: Thursday 19th March

5.30pm Galleries Kerry Briers: Peek into the Vicar's Grange Box

7.30pm Old Kirk Joe Fitzpatrick: Archaeological Discoveries at East Lomond Hillfort

Ever wondered what living in Kirkcaldy was like at the time of the Old Kirk consecration in 1244? Kirkcaldy Old Kirk's celebration year commemorating that event 775 years ago made some curious and on **Thursday 20th February Simon Taylor** stepped forward with some answers in a well-attended talk to Kirkcaldy Civic Society.

Simon is a senior lecturer in the University of Glasgow, whose specialist interest in this period of history took us from Roman times to Dysart as St. Serf's centre of Christianity and on to the Old Kirk and the shadowy figure of St. Bryce.

Simon is particularly well-known for his study of Scottish place-names and their derivations, and his extensive knowledge in this field was key in unravelling



the clues in local place-names to what may have gone before.

Thursday 20th February was also the day of Kirkcaldy Galleries' first teatime talk, this time by Sara Smith on "Treasures of The Kirkcaldy Local Studies Collection"

Kirkcaldy Civic Society has teamed up with the Local Studies Section of the Galleries to make these monthly Thursdays a

Double Bill for those interested in Kirkcaldy local history and we are offering teas, coffee and refreshments in Kirkcaldy Old Kirk from 6.45pm especially for those travelling over from the Galleries to hear the Civic Society talk.

The next Double Bill will be on Thursday 19th March when Civic Society member and volunteer at the Galleries Kerry Briers will be giving a "Peek into the Vicar's Grange Box" in the Galleries at 5.30pm., followed by Joe Fitzpatrick in the Old Kirk at 7.30pm describing "Archaeological Discoveries at East Lomond Hillfort."

Entry to the Civic Society talk at the Old Kirk is free. A small donation is requested for refreshments.

Tower Restoration Project : Community Consultation in the Mercat - March 14th

In the past few months the Tower Restoration Project Team has been hard at work. We have appointed Graeme Scoon as our Project Manager and Arc Architects as the lead professionals in the Design Team. Sandra Macrae is helping us with updating our Business Plan and with fund raising applications to meet the total required in the budget.

The Trust is very

grateful for the financial support of sponsors and donors to the project, demonstrated in the £13,000 contributed so far.

However, in seeking funds from grant-giving bodies for the £80,000 still to be raised, we have been asked for further documentary proof of community support for the project.

Here is where you come in! We would love to have a few lines from you indicating

your support for the project to restore the tower and keep it open for local folk and visitors to see Kirkcaldy's heritage and to climb to the top for the magnificent views.

If there was any doubt about the need for work to the tower to secure its future, this fortnight's wind and rain have shown it, with the floors soaked from the leaking roof and the blown-out window-panes. "It's raining inside!"

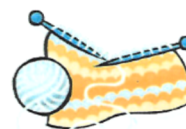

Over two billion people are exposed to floods, earthquakes, landslides, volcanos and cyclones in cities of low-to-middle income countries. And this figure is expected to double by 2050. To coordinate disaster risk management in such places, a new £20 million research initiative, *Tomorrow's Cities*, has been developed for Kathmandu, Istanbul, Nairobi and Quito. RSGS President Iain Stewart will explain how this project aims to better protect the poorest, most marginalised populations living in our planet's riskiest cities.
