

ELDER FAMILY

From time to time the Trust receives enquiries from those tracing their family history, and recently we were happily able to help the Parish Secretary at St. Austin's Priory in Ivybridge, Hazel Smith.

Hazel's ancestors are the Elder family, a significant family in the history of Kirkcaldy in the 19th century, after they came here from Edinburgh.

George Elder was a merchant and ship owner, living with his wife Joanna Haddo Lang in Elder's Brae, part of the High Street near Port Brae, in the mid-19th century. His business prospered and their 4 sons William, Alexander Lang, George and Thomas, all developed it further by establishing the end of the business in Melbourne and then Adelaide, Australia. In 1861 George Elder built a new mansion house called Adelaide House, in Kirkcaldy, which was finally demolished around 1936 to make way for the present Town House.

One of the 3 Elder daughters, Joanna, married Robert Barr Smith, a fellow-Scot, in Australia and the couple joined business interests there with Thomas

Elder, expanding with success to today the Elder Smith Company. Thomas stayed in Australia, and was knighted. He acquired great wealth and was a benefactor to many local causes. His statue stands outside Adelaide University, which he endowed.

Another sister, Elizabeth, married the Old Kirk Minister, John Alexander. In 1843 he left the Kirk at the Disruption and set up the Free Kirk in Tolbooth Street. Elizabeth died at 33 years old in 1858 and is buried in Kirkcaldy Old Kirkyard beside her parents, and her grandfather, William Elder, originally a glovemaker from South Leith.

TRAILBLAZING WOMEN: THE CAMPBELLS OF KIRKCALDY

Strong family ties with the University of St. Andrews are nowhere better exemplified than by the Campbells of Kirkcaldy, 8 sisters and 1 brother with at least one sibling attending St Andrews between 1898-1934, except for 1922/3. Third sister LIZZIE (MABEL) RENWICK CAMPBELL (1885-1939) graduated MA in 1906 and MBChB in 1909. She worked as anaesthetist and gynaecologist in Newcastle and Lecturer in the Medical family of Armstrong College there.

Next sister ADELINE HERBERT CAMPBELL (1887-1965) gained her MA in 1909 and MBChB in 1912. She served with the Scottish Women's Hospital in Serbia under Dr Elsie Inglis and in France with the Women's Auxiliary Army Corps at the American Hospital, Le Havre, then practiced in Edinburgh 1919-54.



The youngest sister ISHBEL GRACE MACNAUGHTON CAMPBELL (1905-1997), BSc 1926, became a research chemist, won a Carnegie Fellowship, studied at Cornell and returned to Scotland to teach at St Andrews, and colleges in Swanley, Bedford and Southampton, being Reader in Chemistry at the latter university by her retirement in 1971.

These were the remarkable children of Dr. John Campbell, Minister of Kirkcaldy Old Kirk from 1881 to 1927 and were brought up in the Manse next door to the Kirk on the corner of Townsend Place.

DR. CAMPBELL AND THE BIRTH OF ST. JOHN'S CHURCH

Recently a talk on the Old Kirk: Past, Present & Future to the ladies of Bennochy Church Guild reminded me that the original St. John's Church on that site was a daughter church of the Old Kirk.

When the railway came in 1846, the town started to grow beyond it and Dr. Campbell decided a new Church Extension was needed. He started it meeting in the canteen of Caledonian Linen Mills and a Committee was formed to provide a permanent

building. An iron church was inspected but rejected as not in good enough condition to be reassembled in Kirkcaldy. Finally in 1908 on Mr. Oswald's land in Meldrum Road, funded by subscribers, St. John's Church was opened.
