Do you remember Anthony's Hotel?

Anthony's Hotel was a well-known venue in Kirkcaldy for weddings, celebratory dinners, dance classes, and more. Now of course it has been replaced by Gowrie House Care Home.

However, this was all news to the American couple who a fortnight ago visited Kirkcaldy as the town of Andy West's ancestors, John and Mary Anthony, proprietors of not just one but four incarnations of Anthony's Hotel!

At the Downie Lounge they received such a warm welcome, followed by a comprehensive historic tour of the High Street area and the hotel sites, and a trip up the tower for a bird's-eye view, that they abandoned thoughts of going on to St. Andrews in favour of Kirkcaldy's history!

Those 4 sites for Anthony's Hotel? Firstly, Anthony's West End Temperance Hotel at the corner of 1 Charlotte Street, then the house where the dental practice now is, thirdly the Whyte House itself and only in 1924, just before Mary Anthony's death, the Albert Road site. It was then called Gowrie House, the home of Mr. and Mrs, D. Landale, from whom the Anthonys bought it, later adding on the former St. Peter's Manse next to it.

Re-dedication of Burne-Jones Window

At last - it's back!

The Burne-Jones window depicting Miriam and Ruth is back in its place in the Old Kirk and is shining brighter than ever.

Mark Bambrough, who with his team completed the task of restoration, explained all the work of cleaning and making new pieces to fill in the holes made by vandals was done by hand. The window itself has a sheet of protective glazing and it is specially ventilated to avoid damaging condensation, while a grille outside stops a repeat of the vandalism effects.

Now comes the time for a celebratory re-dedication of the window and we plan to hold this on Sunday 21st October at 2pm in the Old Kirk.

There will be music from one of our new Organ scholars and a contribution from Mark about the artist's approach to the work of restoration, and it is hoped to have an art historian telling us something of why Burne-Jones was held in such high esteem for his work. We will of course finish off the proceedings with some refreshments for the occasion.


Kirkcaldy Music Society

Kirkcaldy Civic Society Hallowe'en Ghost Walk 2018

Go carefully down Kirk Wynd on Hallowe'en this year for on this one night there will be ghosts about in Kirkcaldy Old Kirkyard and down the town, rising from their graves to tell their stories to those who dare to listen!

Those fearless individuals willing to go on Kirkcaldy Civic Society's Ghost Walk should meet at the Hunter Hall in Kirk Wynd on Wednesday 31st October between 6pm and 6.15pm. Intrepid guides from Kirkcaldy Civic Society will lead you through the darkened graveyard and down the town, in small groups at 5 minute intervals for safety, to meet some of Kirkcaldy's past characters (and a few surprises!) We will make our way to sanctuary for spooky refreshments to revive any flagging spirits(!) A small donation is requested for this - suggested £2/£3 for adults

Families are welcome and there will be a small prize for the best fancy dress costume worn on the Ghost Walk. Who will appear this year? Come and see!



7th Fife Gravestones Conference: Saturday October 27th

'We spend our years as a tale that is told'

So runs Mr. Russell's epitaph in Kirkcaldy Old Kirk graveyard., and on Saturday October 27th Fife Gravestones Conference 2018 will be considering some of the tales about our forebears, their lives and their society that are revealed by their commemoration in death.

How did our ancestors cope when the disaster of the Black Death struck their communities in the 14th century? And plague in 1584 again? Is it true that a Kirkcaldy woman took the plague to Leith and 1400 died in Edinburgh as a result? Dr. Beth Thomas from St. Andrews University will address this interesting topic for us.

Eleanor Young of Logie Old Graveyard Group will chart the history of an ancient kirk and kirkyard in the Ochil Hills which have been restored to their former splendour, allowing visitors to see beautiful carved mortality symbols and trade emblems on the gravestones, while Daniel Farrell will talk on Fife Kirkyards and their epitaphs.

How do you read these interesting and sometimes curious epithets? Professor George Thomson will talk on lettering and calligraphy: his expertise unlocked the identity behind a broken memorial stone in our manse garden and solved a mystery from the 17th century!

Gravestones and graveyards offer fascinating insights into past lives and the ways in which different societies have dealt with death and burial over the years.
Christopher Dingwall will share his expertise on the Garden Cemetery Movement when Victorians designed graveyards as pleasure grounds to walk in.

Today, there are plans to create an Eco-cemetery and columbarium near Kinghorn Loch. I leave Richard Brewster from the Community Land Association there to explain to the mystified what a columbarium is and how this project has come about!

As we look forward, is it important to preserve historic graveyards? Can we justify that financially when local authorities are looking for savings everywhere? Susan Buckham, former Carved Stone Adviser, will bring some insights from her recent projects with Edinburgh's World Heritage graveyards to engage our interest in this question.

This seventh Fife Grave Stones Conference hosted by Kirkcaldy Civic Society in Kirkcaldy's Old Kirk between 10am and 4pm on 27th October brings together these seven experts whose insights are guaranteed to be informative, thought provoking and entertaining.

In addition to the talks, there will be an exhibition where a dozen stallholders will be offering books, CDs and other relevant products for sale.
