Despite the creeping chill into our nights and the dashed hopes of Fife jazz fans who had eagerly anticipated a Rose Room concert on Saturday 26th September, we want to give you a warm and musical welcome to the Old Kirk this weekend!

But how, with Government restrictions still postponing live music concerts? Read on!



Clark Stewart is a singer and entertainer with extensive experience performing in theatres, television, radio, and Cabaret.

His acclaimed tribute One Night In Las Vegas features songs from the Rat Pack and other Vegas legends Bobby Darin, Barry Manilow, Neil Diamond, Matt Monro, Elvis, Tony Christie and Michael Buble. Remember these timeless classics?: Lady Is A Tramp, Come Fly With Me, Mr Bojangles, New York, That's Life, Fly Me To The Moon, My Way, and Under My Skin?

Now you have a chance to hear them again, recorded a few days ago by Clark in the Old Kirk and available to audiences in their own homes.

Langtoun Jazz Secretary Grace Black has worked hard to keep music flowing for local audiences and hopes that funds raised this way will pave the way for the Langtoun Jazz Festival postponed till next year, as well as helping the Old Kirk stay afloat and musicians, like Clark, who have been unable to work since March.

Clark has spent over 28 years performing around the world onboard luxury Cruise Ships and was the youngest ever Cruise Director on board the world-famous "Queen Elizabeth 2".

While at home in Scotland, he has performed in many prestigious venues including Kings Theatre (Edinburgh), Usher Hall, our own Adam Smith Theatre, and Carnegie Hall, and appeared many times on STV and BBC television as well as playing leading roles in many musicals and pantomimes.

"Doing on-line events is a small way of trying to help

musicians such as Clark in these difficult times, but it is no substitute for performing to a paying audience." says Grace. "With the next review of restrictions due in early October, Langtoun Jazz has provisionally rescheduled the Rose Room concert for Saturday 24 October in Kirkcaldy Old Kirk but given latest tougher restrictions there are indications that the date is likely to be delayed further."

Let's hope it won't be too long before we can hear live music again –the Old Kirk is ready! Meantime, take the opportunity to enjoy this show!

Have you noticed? Our trees in the graveyard have a lot of dead wood on them this year. Fife Council, who maintain the graveyard, have called in their tree expert to have a look and see what needs to be done to help them.

These trees with their twisted stems and weeping habit are weeping ash trees, much planted in ornamental situations by the Victorians.

The picture below shows one of the trees in winter, with its leaves having fallen.

Tower Restoration Project



Now that plans have been made and details worked out, tenders submitted and a contractor chosen, the emphasis on the tower restoration programme has become securing the funds to make it happen!

On 1st September we submitted a second round application to the National Lottery Heritage Fund, who, if we were to be successful, would, together with Historic Environment Scotland, and Fife Environment Trust, fund more than half of the necessary money.

Next month the decision-making Panel would have visited us in person but for the threat from Covid-19. However we will instead deliver a presentation and have an online meeting to showcase our plans. Keep your fingers crossed!

Other applications are underway, but next month we will be relaunching our online Crowdfunding scheme, seeking to raise funds to add to those already given.

More will be said then about our target and where we have reached, but I do wish to thank those who have contributed to Sponsor-a-Step, some many months ago and some just last week.

Your generosity has spurred us on and now we are within sight of realizing this essential target of restoration, so that the tower can remain open and accessible to the community.
